From the Relieving Deputy Principal


Our years 7 and 8 students have recently completed a number of social skills lessons called "Solution Box"; these lessons have been specifically designed by our Learning and Support team for Leumeah High students. Solution Box is intended to support students to classify problems, solve problems and practise their values. When classifying problems, students and staff have been encouraged to use a common language and I would encourage our parents and carers to also use the common language when discussing issues with their child.

The first classification, "solve it now", is used when talking about major incidents such as a fire, someone being seriously hurt or a physical fight. Students are encouraged to always immediately tell an adult for these types of problems. The next classification, "Solve it later", can be used when a student notices a peer feeling sad all of the time or perhaps something like name-calling that happens a number of times. Students are encouraged to take some time to think about the best end result and how they could achieve it, seeking help if needed. The third classification, "Carry on and plan it", refers to things like rumours, feeling like someone is staring or perhaps being called a name once. Students are encouraged to stay calm, distract themselves from the issue and re-evaluate in a few weeks. These problems tend to fade away when a response or attention isn't achieved.

Thanks to our Learning and Support Team for creating and scheduling this fantastic result and to the staff who have been involved in delivering the lessons.

Congratulations to all students for recently completing their exams – we wish you well with the results and look forward to talking about your current achievements and goals for the future at our years 7-10 parent teacher night early next term.




the future. The initiative is unique to Leumeah High School and has been commended for the opportunities that it offers students.
