## Principals Address - 2020 Presentation Day

Good morning students and staff. Welcome to this morning of celebration. A morning where we acknowledge our students who have excelled throughout 2020.

May I begin by acknowledging the D'harawal people who are the traditional custodians of this land and pay my respect to elders past and present of the D'harawal nation and extend that respect to all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people here with us this morning.

Normally each year I would use today to highlight the many school successes over the past year. This year however, I intend to mention only two... You the students and all my staff.

Firstly I would like acknowledge the wonderful work of your teachers and all the support and office staff. This year has been the most challenging year for schools I have ever experienced. With the onset of COVID teachers were asked within 48 hours to totally change the way teachers have worked for, basically ever. We went from classroom learning to on line learning in the blink of an eye. Teachers learnt new skills and new methods of delivery to ensure your learning continued. They called home every day to check on you: to see if you were okay and what was needed to help you with your learning. On your return to school, teachers were still challenged in that many of the activities we take for granted such as excursions and sport could not go ahead. Your teachers have worked tirelessly. From the Deputies, Mr Glasgow, Ms Ferro, Mr Fryer - to all the head Teachers, classroom teachers, office staff, SLSO's, canteen ladies, cleaners. All have been brilliant and I will forever be in awe of the role they have played to keep you safe. I am constantly humbled by their commitment, passion and unfailing dedication to do the best for you, that is, the students of our school.

To you the students. You are the reason schools exist. You too have been awesome this year. The way you first adapted to change by learning to work online at home. This was no easy feat. Some of you struggled at this but many of you simply knuckled down to the task at hand and got on with it. You certainly were living up to our school motto of "strive to succeed". On your return from lock down you worked with your teachers to ensure Leumeah remained not just a great place to learn, but also a safe place to learn. We have had so few excursions, sports carnivals and other activities that give our school so much life, and also a break from the daily routine of learning, but you have continued to follow the school values of preparation Respect, Aim and Co-operation. Thank you for the way you have co-operated with your teachers this year.

As you know this will be my last ever presentation day here at Leumeah High School as I will be retiring at the end of next week. I would like to take just a few minutes to talk about the importance of learning.

Every one of you has something you're good at. Every one of you has something to offer. And you have a responsibility to yourself to discover what this is. Maybe you could be a good writer — maybe even good enough to write a book or reports in a newspaper but you won't know until you try in your English class. Maybe one day you will discover a new medicine or vaccine — but you might not know it until you do a project for your science class that you excel at. Maybe one day you might be a lawyer but you might not know that until you join the SRC, the ARC or the debating team.

And no matter what you want to do with your life -I guarantee that you'll need an education to do it. You want to be a doctor, an accountant, or a police officer. You want to be a nurse or an architect, or a builder, you are going to need a good education for every single one of those careers. You can't drop out of school and just drop into a good job. You've got to work for it and train for it and learn for it.

And this isn't just important for your own life and your own future. What you make of your education may one day help many other people. You need the knowledge and problem-solving skills you learn in science and maths to

maybe one day cure diseases like cancer or COVID 19, and to develop new methods for generating power to protect our environment. You'll need the creativity and ingenuity you develop in all your classes to write that hit movie.

Every single one of you need to develop your talents, skills and intellect so you can help solve our most difficult problems. If you don't do that – if you quit on school – you're not just quitting on yourself, you're quitting on all of us.

Now I know it's not always easy to do well in school. I know that many of you have challenges in your lives right now that can make it hard to focus on your schoolwork.

I get that. I know what that's like. Where you are right now though, doesn't have to determine where you'll end up. No one's written your future for you. You make your own future.

All of us face challenges in our lives just like you do. But the people who succeed are those who don't give up..... They chose to take responsibility for their education and set goals for themselves. And I expect all of you to do the same. That's why I want each of you to again think about the goals that you set for your education — and to do everything you can to meet them. Your goal can be something as simple as doing all your homework, paying attention in class, or spending time each day reading a book. Whatever you decide to do, I want you to stick to it. I want you to really work at it. I know that sometimes, young people get the sense from TV that you can be rich and famous without any hard work. But that is only on TV.

The truth is, being successful is hard. You won't love every subject you study. You won't click with every teacher. Not every homework assignment will seem completely relevant to your life right this minute. And you will rarely, if ever, succeed at anything the first time you try.

No one's born being good at things, you become good at things through hard work. You're not a state of origin player the first time you play rugby league. You've got to practice. It's the same with your schoolwork. You might have to do a maths problem many times before you get it right, or read something a few times before you understand it, or do a few drafts of an essay before it's good enough to hand in.

Don't be afraid to ask questions. Don't be afraid to ask for help when you need it. As a principal, I do that almost every day. Asking for help isn't a sign of weakness, it's a sign of strength. It shows you have the courage to admit when you don't know something, and to learn something new. So find an adult you trust – a parent, grandparent or teacher; – and ask them to help you stay on track to meet your goals.

And even when you're struggling, even when you're discouraged, and you may feel like other people have given up on you – don't ever give up on yourself.

Your families, your teachers, and I are doing everything we can to make sure you have the education you need to answer these questions. But you've got to do your part too. So I expect you to get serious. I expect you to put your best effort into everything you do. I want great things from each of you. So don't let your school down – don't let your family down, don't let yourself down. Make us all proud. I know each of you can do it. The students who are receiving recognition this morning have shown what happens when you put your best effort into what you do.

It has been the greatest privilege to have been Principal of Leumeah High School. Thank you to all the dedicated staff I have worked with over the past 11 years, to the countless parents I have met and worked with and finally, to the couple of 1000 students who have attended Leumeah. It is all of you, that make teaching such a wonderful, fulfilling career.

I wish you all a Merry Christmas, a prosperous new year and an enjoyable and safe holiday. Thank You.










## From the Mathematics Faculty

By the time you read this, Year 12 will have completed their H.S.C. Exams in Mathematics Standard 1, Mathematics Standard 2, Mathematics Advanced and Extension 1 Mathematics. We wish them all the best for their future endeavours and hope that they achieve the results commensurate with their efforts.

Year 11's first H.S.C. Assessment Task has been issued for each Mathematics course. They have all started work on the H.S.C. Course and it is vitally important that they are continually revising to ensure that they are consolidating the concepts that have been taught. All Mathematics students have a take-home task based on the topic of Financial Mathematics, and it is imperative that they have already started this. It is due Term 1 2020 on Monday Week 3, so they have time this year to receive feedback from their teachers on how they are progressing with the task.

This year has been a very stressful year for both staff and students, but we have overcome the challenges that were presented to us. Lessons were presented in a variety of ways including video lessons and annotated PowerPoints, a lot of Zoom sessions were held and many new skills were learnt by both staff and students. Staff have since started to present their class lessons using iPads which continued to provide a measure of continuity and connection between students and their teachers.

For 2021, the Mathematics staff expects all students from Years 7 to 12 to be prepared by bringing the necessary equipment to each mathematics lesson, including their exercise book, iPads (fully charged for Years 7 and 8), mathematics textbook (for Years 9 to 12), pens, ruler, pencil and calculator.

Years 7 - 10 have participated in project based learning to help them engage with their topics and expand on their team building skills. We have been able to incorporate the use of Lego in our subjects so students can use their skills to encourage collaboration, communication, critical thinking and creativity. We have also used ICT tools to help promote research skills and to increase the options available to meet the specific learning needs of students



across a wide range of abilities. These learning technologies have been used for demonstration purposes, looking at focus questions and answering, and to assign tasks for individual and group work. The students have adapted really well to these new learning tools and have been able to engage in a variety of learning strategies to help them expand their understanding of the topics studied in their classes.

Year 10 civics and citizenship and geography worked on sustainable houses this semester. Over a couple of weeks the students worked together in small groups to design and build, in the form of a model, blue print or mine craft city to show how their house reduces its environmental and social impacts whilst saving money on the cost of living. The students worked well together and were able to come up with some really great ideas to create a house which is energy efficient by itself, environmentally healthy, respectful for the natural environment and comfortable for family life. We really enjoyed watching all the projects come together.

#### From the PDHPE Faculty

2020, what are year!

My first year at Leumeah High School has flown by and I could not help but take the opportunity to say how great it has been to be apart of such a thriving school community. I am humbled by the dedication of students, staff and the wider school community during some of the most difficult and trying challenges we have all faced.

Students in Year 7-10 PDHPE continued their focus on progressing their personal skills, knowledge and understanding of the many contextual issues that they face in 21<sup>st</sup> century society. With a strong emphasis in PDHPE programs in developing resilience and improving healthy habits, students were engaged in a range of learning opportunities that took on a holistic approach to health in a time that required students to be versatile and adaptive. In PDHPE lessons students had plenty of team building and practical lessons that strived towards maintaining a sense of connection to themselves and each other.

In our Year 9/10 Elective classes of Child Studies, PASS and Outdoor Education, students have participated in a range of practical based learning opportunities that enabled them to put into action the theoretical concepts they studied while working from home in Term 1 and 2. This involved Looking after the Real Care babies and developing creative toys and books in Child studies. In PASS they completed a range of fitness testing and session planning opportunities as well as immersing themselves in a range of new and emerging sports including the favourite European Handball. Outdoor Education finally got to head out on some adventures and apply some skills learnt throughout the year, with students heading to Tree Tops, a 2-night camp to Honeymoon Bay and learning swim survival skills at the pool.

Our senior students in PDHPE, CAFS and SLR worked hard to overcome the obstacles of working from home with some outstanding results from our Year 12 students in their final year of schooling. Well done to Om T. who topped our PDHPE group and Nathan H. for his 1<sup>st</sup> place in SLR. In Preliminary PDHPE Cassandra D. was our top performer, Mele T. was 1<sup>st</sup> in Year 11 CAFS and Losana L. finished 1<sup>st</sup> in SLR. Students in Year 11 are encouraged to continue making a concerted effort with their studies moving into their HSC year.

A BIG thanks to the PDHPE Staff who have been working tirelessly once again in an effort to continue to revamp and provide positive and future focused learning in PDHPE. Had 6 excursion planned – had 6 excursions cancelled due to COVID.







I could not have imagined the implementation of Ipads into our year 7 science classes being more successful. Redesigned teaching units that have contextual relevance as well as being engaging and thought provoking have exceeded our expectations in terms of students' responsiveness and class participation. The innovative and creative work student have been able to produce has increased their understanding of scientific concepts and assisted students in remaining on task and committed to course outcomes. Increased submission rates of assessment tasks, increased motivation to completing extension tasks and a decrease in classroom incidences have all been observed and compared to other years. So successful has the initiative been that teachers have been extended these practices to the other years, observing similar trends in the increased motivation, self-advocacy and completion of course work with our senior classes. Beyond excited for future possibilities.

The Science faculty continues to meet new challenges with enthusiasm and embrace the direction change takes us.




